Countless hours are spent counseling, mentoring, and educating convicted criminals or those accused of a crime.

Inmate programs include brick masonry, GED, basic education, various substance abuse diversion classes, HIV awareness, parenting, English as a second language and faith-based guidance. So far this year, nearly 1500 inmates have completed classes. Some have passed more than one course. All pass with a promise to try and turn their lives around when they get out from behind bars.
