18,000 Names ENGRAVED IN MARBLE

POLICE UNITY TOUR HAS SPECIAL MEANING FOR DEPUTY

It takes equal parts muscle and heart to pedal 240 miles. This year, the Newport News Sheriff's Office fielded three bicyclists for the Police Unity Tour: Deputies William Churchill, Steve Sheridan, and Robert "Bobby" Hicks.

The Police Unity Tour is an annual tribute to those brothers and sisters who died in the line of duty. On May 10th, hundreds of bicyclists left Portsmouth for Washington D.C. They would end the three day ride at the National Law Enforcement Officer's Memorial. There are nearly 18,000 names engraved in the blue-gray marble walls of the memorial.

K-9 Unit Shows Its Teeth

It was late afternoon, January 22, 2007 Master Deputy Wayne Hill and his narcotics dog Kwade rolled-up on a car at Jefferson and Bland. There were three men in the car and 11 grams of marijuana. It was Deputy Kwade's first bust. He sniffed-out the bad guys only 10-days after being certified for duty.

The arrests made by Deputies Hill and Kwade illustrate the cooperation between the Newport News Sheriff's Office and Newport News Police Department. The Sheriff's Office K-9 Unit was asked to assist with the search of a suspicious vehicle.

The reason behind why the city Sheriff's Office established its own K-9 Unit was two fold: rid the jail of illegal drugs and quickly return to the docket when bomb threats interrupt court.

Sheriff Gabe Morgan is willing to acknowledge the issue. "I have to believe what we can catch as humans is limited," admitted Sheriff Morgan. "A dog's sense of smell can root out the drugs. The dogs also have a deterrent effect. If they (inmates) know that there are random searches (of the jail), it will eradicate the flow of drugs."

Another major challenge is the number of bomb threats that interfere with court business. On average, the courts receive one bomb threat a month.

"When you go into a room and you're cooking bacon and eggs and stuff in the morning, you smell the bacon. It's the strongest odor. The dog – he smells the eggs, the oil, the dough you use to make the biscuits with. I mean their noses are so sensitive. That is how they can pick-up these odors so good," explained Trooper Jeff Lovell.

The Police Unity Tour motto is, "We Ride for Those Who Died." For Deputy Hicks, the Unity Tour couldn't be more personal. "brother" he is riding for is his father. Lt. Robert T. Hicks was with the Middlesex County Sheriff's Office when he died on May 20, 1984 responding to a distressed motorist call. His car careened off the Newman Bridge in Urbanna landing upside down in the deep waters of the creek below. On Day One of this year's ride, a moment of silence was held on the bridge in honor of the late Lt. Hicks. In addition, the Hicks' family and the Middlesex County Sheriff's Office were presented with plaques honoring the service and memory of the elder Hicks.

Every bicyclist was assigned the name of a fallen officer for whom to ride. Each wore a bracelet engraved with a name, agency and EOW, End of Watch. The bracelets provided motivation and inspiration. The discomfort of a bike saddle was nothing compared to the price that so many had paid.

The Police Unity Tour was founded in 1997 by the Florham Park, NJ Police Department. Virginia established Chapter IV in 2000. The Unity Tour is the single largest private/corporate sponsor of the Memorial Fund. This year, Virginia Chapter IV raised \$345,000. ◊
