LESSON ON GANG PREVENTION

Had Inmates Talking to Middle School Students

More and more young people are being prosecuted for more and more violent crime. And many of those crimes are linked to gang activity.

The Newport News Sheriff's Office has joined forces with the Commonwealth's Attorney's Office in a united effort to stop young people from joining organized street gangs.

Artesia Todd, Assistant Prosecutor with the Commonwealth's Attorney's Office, spearheaded a gang prevention program. "I am seeing too many of young people in the courtroom," Todd said. "We are prosecuting them because of the crimes they are committing. And what we want to do is try and reach out to them before they make bad decisions," Todd continued.

Principals at four different middle schools agreed to hold assemblies for 8th grade students: Reservoir, An Achievable Dream, Passage and Huntington.

Theater students from Woodside High School opened each of the assemblies with a play about gang activity. The script was gripping. Peers often pay more attention to peers. So this performance with young actors appeared to have an impact on the young audience.

The Sheriff's Office found a creative way to address the consequences of crime by producing a short documentary movie. Three inmates, each 24 years old, spoke the truth about jail. Who better to talk about the consequences of crime than those who are paying the price?

One inmate is an alleged gang member. His charges include murder and intimidating witnesses.

"You hurting more than just yourself You may not be hurting your so-called 'friends.' But you're hurting your family. It's a waste of your life."

Another got involved in the criminal justice system at age nine. At age eleven he got caught setting fire to the judge's house. He served more than two years for arson. "Like I say, most of my life I've been incarcerated. All my younger years – all my teenage years I've done give to DOC."

For the girls in the audience, there was female inmate. She got pregnant at age 15 by a 25 year old man who didn't stick around. By today's standards, she started using drugs late in life. She was about twenty. "I got married to a guy that was smoking crack and trying to get him to stay home – I thought if I started doing it, it would be better for us. But that didn't happen."

What happened was a downward spiral into addiction and prostitution to pay for her habit. "There are no friends in the crack game. There are no friends in the street. The only friends is your family."

Talking about how gangs impact the community was RSVP (Retired & Senior Volunteer Program) and a mother whose son was killed by a gang. The video of her family's story was courtesy of the Daily Press as part of their news coverage of the murder of 19-year old Erique Shaw in November of 2007.

Julia Haynes has been left to mourn the loss of one child while trying to raise another boy who looked up to Erique.

"When you get into a gang, your choice out is death. My son died because he was trying to get out. It took him to see his little brother with the flag. When he saw his brother doing that, he was like, 'Okay wait. I can't get down.' He got killed because he wanted out."

We, of course, love "Miss L" and appreciate her dedication to the inmates in this jail. However, we also understand this place can take its toll on people. No one can blame her for wanting a change in atmosphere.

Ms. Lulofs started coming here to teach GED in September, 2002. Under her tutelage, 89 men have earned their GED.

Miss L doesn't want the spotlight on her resignation, but rather on the accomplishments of her students. Our compliments to both. Let's face it, however, not every GED instructor would choose to teach here. That makes Miss L special, whether she sees it or not.

As one deputy said, "We get paid to keep people locked up. She gets paid to set them free."

Lulofs will continue teaching GED at Drug Court and accepted a new assignment teaching at a church.

She also said we will see her now and again at the jail when she administers the GED practice test.



SHERIFF'S Last Word

The Sheriff's Office competes with other law enforcement agencies for well qualified applicants.

Representatives from Evergreen Solutions, LLC spent a couple of weeks in February looking at the Newport News Sheriff's Office. Evergreen is a consulting firm out of Florida that specializes in corrections management. Their visit is part of my continued effort to seek a fair pay scale at the Newport News Sheriff's Office. Evergreen staff collected data for an in-depth and comprehensive job audit.

A lot of preparation was made prior to Evergreen's arrival. For that, I extend a special thank you to Sergeant Audrey Maule. Detailed salary information had to be collected; schedules coordinated, and site tours and demonstrations arranged. These efforts were the primary responsibility of Sgt. Maule.

I also wish to thank each and every person who was interviewed and surveyed by Evergreen. All of your hard work and efforts were invaluable.

Why the job audit? This is our chance to shine. It is our chance to show how we compare to the police department and to park rangers. Entry level pay and pay grades are higher at those two city agencies than at the NNSO. It is my goal to have our positions included in the

City Pay Plan, thereby developing a competitive pay scale.

Evergreen staff was very complimentary of their experience here at the Sheriff's Office. During our exit interview, they praised the professionalism of all the personnel they had the pleasure of working with.

I commend you for your hard work and endless efforts. I will keep you updated on the progress of the job audit and what it means to you.

Cost saving proposal presented to City.

I also want to update you on communications between me and City leaders. The Newport News Sheriff's Office closed 2007 by presenting the Mayor, City Council members, and the City Manager with an overall look at the Sheriff's Office. The December 11 work session showed where we are now and where we want to be in the future. It included staffing needs, expansion plans, equipment shortages, and more.

The second part to the presentation was a cost savings proposal. I presented a thorough comparison of the NNSO and City Farm. I propose the City could save \$2-Million if the NNSO took over the farm operation.

There are duplications of services. In other words, both

agencies perform similar functions. Those redundancies are costly.

According to the State Comp Board 2006 Jail Cost Report, the City Farm's operating costs are the highest in the Eastern Region. It costs \$85.60 daily per inmate at the City Farm compared to \$42.90 at the City Jail.

Currently, Adult Corrections is under using the farm by the City Manager's own admission. Beds remain empty at the farm – at least 100 empty beds – while the jail is bursting at the seams. Hampton Roads Regional Jail is holding an average of 240 of our inmates, even though the city contracts for only 200 beds. The City pays for every extra bed at HRRJ. At the end of any year, the City pays approximately \$500,000 for those additional beds.

It is my contention that the NNSO would better manage the farm. I proposed a new model of operation. Beds at the farm would be filled. Overcrowding at the jail would be eased. Over using HRRJ would be reduced.

Keep up the good work and keep up the faith.
