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



the homeless population. His deputies provide security at the winter PORT shelters.



On the backside of the business card is a handwritten note with a smiley face. Corporal Clinard wrote "Buy your son and your dog a little something." He handed that note and a \$20 bill to Warrick one night while working the homeless

shelter. Obviously Clinard was moved by the man's plight. And Warrick himself was so moved by corporal's the generosity that he cherishes the business card and its message. The night of the art exhibit, Warrick met Sheriff Morgan. He shared his story and the power of an act of kindness.

Homeless men, women and

their children painted wine glasses that were offered for a donation during the evening of "Artists on the Edge." The money benefits CANLINK, one of many programs offered by LINK of Hampton Roads. LINK also has a new division helping terminally ill homeless veterans find hospice care.

People to People, the Newport News race relations and quality of life organization, presented their highest honor, the HERO Award, to Sheriff Gabe Morgan on April 27th.

The presentation was made in front of a packed concert hall at the Ferguson Center for the Arts prior to the performance of the off-Broadway play "Our Young Black Men are Dying and Nobody Seems to Care."



Morgan

received the HERO Award for his continuous devotion to the strengthening race relations in Newport News, for championing the needs of young people, and for his leadership in community awareness of quality of life issues in the City. *People to* People recognized Morgan for being front and center in discussions about

gangs, drugs and guns on the streets of Newport News and how to find solutions in restoring citizen safety.

People to People Co-Chairmen Bud Ramey and Dr. McKinley Price said, "Sheriff Morgan voices a higher vision for the City. He sees a future where young people are not left

> out because they are poor or because of where they live. He sees a future where neighborhoods are re-claimed from gangs."

It is focused on building bridges between races, nurturing a sense of value in the community for diversity and inclusion and championing quality of life issues. He and his staff visited the 9-1-1 call center to extend a personal thank you to dispatchers.

WALK A MILE IN HER SHOES!!!

It was an interesting sight April 4th at City Center Oyster Point. Several dozen men wore women's shoes and marched laps around the fountain. They did it in support of the Center for Sexual Assault Survivors <u>3rd Annual Walk a Mile in Her Shoes</u> event.

Among the walkers were Sheriff Gabe Morgan and more than thirty male deputies. The deputies were in full uniform with the exception of their footwear.

The Center is the only rape crisis center serving the Peninsula. More than \$3,000 was raised at this year's event, \$2,000 of which came directly from pledges raised by deputies. Dean Barker with CSB also walked with the deputies.

Shawna Gray, the Executive Director for The Center, raved about the participation from the Newport News Sheriff's Office. This year's event was the largest so far, and she wants it to grow in size. "What we'd like to see is teams from area community organizations, you know the Boy Scouts, the YMCA, even retailers like Home Depot and Lowe's. We'd like to see teams come out and participate."

Sheriff Morgan made his own challenge, "We (the NNSO) put the challenge out there to the fire department, police department, EMS, all the public safety personnel to join us next year and walk a mile in her shoes."

SHERIFF'S Last Word

It is my pleasure to highlight some of the work going on at the Newport News Sheriff's Office. Without a doubt a lot has happened in the last three months.

On April 20th, Deputy City Manager Neil Morgan and I addressed citizens of Newport News at a Town Hall Meeting about future jail needs. Open and transparent communication is essential in gaining public trust. The City paid for a

study and results were revealed to members of City Council on April 14th. Neil and I agreed those results should also be made public.

A comprehensive study was conducted by MGT of America, Inc., a Texas-based consultant firm that studies correctional systems across the country. Findings from that study, titled "Study of Long-Term Corrections Organizational; Facility Needs," were used to project needs.

The study was undertaken to provide a fresh look at the incarceration system in the City of Newport News and determine ways to save money.

Because of the duplication of services provided by the Sheriff's Office and City Farm, a consolidation of the agencies

would result in a significant amount of money being conserved.

MGT of America, Inc. estimated an annual cost savings of \$1.9 Million under a consolidation.

The main role of the City Farm would remain in effect. Under the proposal, we would continue using inmate labor for city maintenance for an estimated savings of \$2 Million annually. In essence, savings to taxpayers under the

consolidation plan would amount to a sum total of nearly \$4 Million each year.

The findings of the study also revealed that if the City continues with the status quo, there will be a bed shortage by the year 2012.

City Council will discuss the matter further sometime in August.

On another matter, collaboration is key in curbing youth violence. May 7, 2009 was "Youth Advocacy Day." The *Campaign for Youth Justice* invited me to join their panel discussion in the nation's capitol.

Cardenas.

Youth gang crime has taken a toll on Newport News. Gang-related violence has had profound human costs, as well as economic social costs.

Congressman Scott provided details about the "Youth PROMISE Act." The acronym stands for Prison Reduction through Opportunities, Mentoring, Intervention, Support, and Education. The legislation supports evidence-based intervention and treatment options that have been shown to reduce youth crime and delinquency. Congressman Scott and I are committed to working together to remedy violent crime, especially as it concerns young people. Other law enforcement agencies like the Newport News Police Department and the Federal Bureau of Investigation are part of the team solution.
