

Among the awards this year was the Sheriff's Medal, which is given for acts of heroism and meritorious service. Four such medals were presented this year including one to man's best friend.

Canine handler Corporal Wayne Hill and his partner Vader received the medal for apprehending two armed robbery suspects. Cpl. Hill was the first to respond to a dispatch call. Intimidated by the dog, the suspects dropped to the ground and complied with the Corporal's orders. Once the suspects were in handcuffs. Vader was ordered to search for evidence in some tall grass. When Hill approached, he found Vader lying down with a weapon between his paws and pushing it with his nose.

Deputy Kyle Taylor earned the Sheriff's Medal for a separate instance where he assisted police in the apprehension of three burglary suspects. The fourth Sheriff's Medal was presented to Vickie Gaffney for her body of work as the Community Resource Officer.

City Manager Neil Morgan made remarks at the awards ceremony. "It is my view


that a great organization is composed of three things: good people, the tools to do the job, and a plan of action that everyone understands," he said. He acknowledged there is no shortage of good people at the Newport News Sheriff's Office (NNSO).

Remarkable work is being done by the NNSO including efforts to fight against drug trafficking on the Peninsula. Members of the Narcotics Criminal Interdiction Unit, or NCIU, were presented with a Group Achievement Award. So far, the undercover unit has pulled large amounts of illegal narcotics out of the drug trade. Nearly 200 pounds of marijuana with an estimated street value of \$816,000 has been seized: and another \$31.00 worth of cocaine, heroin, ecstasy, OxyContin, and drug money has been confiscated.

The NCIU has also seized dozens of weapons and made dozens of arrests. Their operations are making City streets and neighborhoods safer.

Sheriff Morgan closed the ceremony by thanking the families for their daily show of support and for taking the time out of their schedules to attend the afternoon ceremony. He said, "I know the award recipients and those being promoted appreciate it. We look forward to doing more great things in the coming year. Thank you."

NNPD RECOGNIZES MEMBERS OF NNSO AT SEMI-ANNUAL CEREMONY

The park, Newsome House Museum, and private residences got a facelift. No sooner had new playground equipment been installed at the park, there were families laughing and playing on it. What a wonderful sight!

These cleanups are movements to help empower people to take back their neighborhood. A clear message was sent
