satellite center providing core services for job seekers. The SNAP site provides outreach for "nontraditional" customers lacking computer literacy. Trained individuals will assess the inmates' needs, help with resume preparation,

and connect them to possible employment upon their release or as participants in

the Newport News Sheriff's Office work release program. ❖
